Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! Yes, you read that correctly. Indeed, as we wrap up the month of November, we begin the season of Advent. Within the church calendar, the liturgical season of Advent

marks the beginning of our new church year. You might be wondering why doesn't the church year begin with the birth of Christ at Christmas or the resurrection of Christ at Easter? That is a fair question. The liturgical year gives voice to the human experience through times of joy, sorrow, reflection, lament, and new life, and even gives us space for waiting. This reality sums up what Advent is all about. The church year intentionally does not begin with the highlights of our faith in the birth or resurrection of Christ. In contrast, it begins by modeling a posture of preparation.

This time of waiting is a gift to us as we enter the month of December. Every year, somehow, these weeks seem to go faster and faster. The days blur together between the preparations, the gatherings, the shopping, the to-do lists, and all we try to cram into this month. Fortunately, Advent serves as a pause button, a sticky note reminder that indeed God is doing a new thing. While God's Spirit is always at work, we pause and pray that we might become more aware of it. Advent gives us the freedom to ponder, explore, wonder, and consider what God has done, is doing, and will continue to do in our lives.

Advent gives permission to wait with expectant hearts for the coming of our Savior. As my brother would say, "Advent is a time we focus not on what we can see, but on what it is like to not be able to see yet. Sometimes the journey to God begins not with a discovery, but with a desire for something more. That's Advent." Come, let us live into this season- let us draw near to the one who has drawn near to us.

Dear friends, family, and partners in mission,

We are *finally* able to sleep with windows open after what was an insanely hot and uncomfortable summer. I am hearing from friends in MN that temps are chilly now, requiring jackets. I love autumn... just wish it were a little longer.

In addition to my newsletters, I am including a special invitation for you to join us in a pretty big campaign. As you probably already know, our campus includes a kindergarten, junior high, senior high, and college. The only big piece that has been missing was an elementary school.

In the coming school year, beginning in April 2024, this will change. Our campus has been undergoing an intense process of building what will be called "Lutheran International Elementary School." The school will be a fully bilingual international school and will be built on the mission principles that guide our entire campus. A Lutheran pastor will be doing chapel services, making this one of the only Pre-K through university Christian campuses in the country. It really is a magnificent step and occurs just as our campus is headed into the celebration of the 100th anniversary of its founding.

As you can imagine, the amount of preparation in terms of personnel, buildings, logistics, and materials is incredible. One of the tiny ways I have been asked to help is by inquiring of our church support network about whether you might be interested in purchasing a book or two for their library. At this point, the only English resources on campus are in the junior high, and the pickings are scarce! We would love to be able to offer classics for our incoming students, some of whom already know quite a bit of English, and some who might be just beginning.

I have developed a "wish list" on the **Japanese** Amazon site (amazon.co.jp) to *hopefully* make it easier to purchase. The dollar is very strong right now, so your money will go about twice as far as it did a year ago. The books I put on the wish list are all hardcover, since they will be in a library and prone to heavier use than normal. However, if you feel like you'd rather stretch your money

a little farther and order paperback, we will of course be equally grateful. I am attaching a "how to order on a Japanese website" instruction sheet, as the process will inevitably involve some interfacing with the Amazon-Japan site.

We are hoping to wrap up this campaign by the end of December, so if you would keep this project on your prayer list, we would be so grateful.

Feel free to pass along the link and instruction page to other folks who are literacy advocates or maybe wish to contribute in this way toward the growth of our Lutheran institutions. We are so grateful for your help and remain faithful that the Lord is holding this project in His hands. "Season of seasoning"

I've been monitoring my social media and seeing many posts of people in the U.S. travelling or preparing for Thanksgiving, which is right around the corner. I have only spent two Thanksgivings in the U.S. over the past twenty years, but the memories of specific aromas wafting from the kitchen are still strong. There are specific seasonings that characterize Thanksgiving for me, including sage, rosemary, orange, vanilla, nutmeg, and cinnamon. I imagine that for most Americans, any of these seasonings can immediately conjure a mental image of a delicious food.

In fact, I would even go so far as to suggest that if I ask what word comes after "pumpkin," someone will say "pie." Cranberry? Relish. Whipped? Cream! We have created word pairs and attached them to memories that with time have "seasoned" in their own way.

The same is true for our worship life, and specifically the hymns we sing. Many of us come from traditional worship backgrounds where if I were to say, "Great is Thy..." you could fill in the rest—"faithfulness"— pretty easily. "Joy to the?" World, of course. These words, phrases, lyrics have been embedded into our memory in such a way as to shape how we know God and Christ Jesus. The lyrics have penetrated our souls so that no other word besides "faithfulness" really makes sense for us. Sometimes we can't even speak the words without singing them, at least in our heads! The poetry we sing inspires our imagination, our thoughts, our prayers, and behaviors. Marinating in the text of a well-written hymn is time well spent.

I pray that this Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas, that the wonders of light in darkness, the power of a meek and lowly King in the form of a baby, and the humility of abundant grace despite our brokenness bless you and the conversations you have at the dinner table(s). May a spirit of thankfulness awaken your hearts and minds to a new and fresh spiritual response.

Kyushu Lutheran International School, Primary School Division

In the spring of 2024, our little Lutheran campus will welcome an addition to the family. It will be the site of the first accredited international elementary school in Kumamoto.

With the construction of TSMC—a Taiwanese semiconductor plant—the influx of international school-aged children is steadily increasing and is expected to explode this coming spring. Because our campus has a long history of international connectivity and strong English programs at both the secondary and college level, Luther was tapped by both the prefectural and national government to develop an international elementary school. The school needed to be able to cater to students both from abroad and from Kumamoto who wish to receive their education in English and with an eye toward using an I.B. curriculum. This is a major undertaking and has not been without some dissent from faculty.

Nevertheless, students are being recruited, faculty hired, facilities renovated or built, and curriculum developed. The energy surrounding this next step in expanding our mission is one of both excitement and a fair degree of nervousness. As you can imagine, the various pressures for such an undertaking are significant, and the bureaucracy for institutions is mind-blowing. Our college president, Michiaki Matsumoto, has been a strong proponent and advocate for this initiative from its inception. As a former English teacher at the college and a keen administrator, he has spearheaded many of the complex projects that were necessary to create this addition to our campus.

Knowing that many of our partners in mission are often interested in helping with varying projects around the world, we are establishing a short but hopefully robust campaign to help our new elementary campus with establishing its library. Because it is a Christian campus, we are interested in procuring books that are written with Christian education in mind. Also, because the library needs to have a large repository of books written in English for grades 1-6, we are looking for classic children's books, preferably hardcover, to fill the shelves. If you or someone you know is interested in purchasing books for this effort, advising our staff about library resources, or praying for this mini-ministry, please look at the information sheet (attached in this email) that will help you navigate the amazon-Japan website to help with this effort. Shipping from North America is exorbitantly expensive, so we decided to set up a "Wish List" on the amazon.co.jp (Amazon-Japan) website. It functions almost exactly the same as the U.S.-based site, but there are a few hoops to jump through in order to place an order. Hopefully the information sheet will help with that. From the bottom of our collective hearts, we say Arigatou Gozaimasu! Taihen Yoroshiku Onegaishimasu. (envision a deep bow here!)

Mary the Brave: Mary the God Bearer

As a young pastor and working mom, I struggled with the challenges of balancing work and home life, often

while carrying a child in my womb, arms, on my hip, in a front or back baby pack, or car seat. Now my children are adults, and I have the joy of watching them carry my grandchildren. They do it differently than I did, their car seats are much nicer than the ones we had, but like us, they carry their children with much love. I am still carrying my adult children and grandchildren and will always carry them, in my heart with much love. This Advent and Christmas season I'm reflecting on Mary, the God bearer. (In Greek it's Theotokos².) Mary carried Jesus. Like all parents she carried her child with love, but she is also the God bearer. It was a brave thing Mary did to bear God into the world.

To love is a brave thing. It is a brave thing to become a parent. Mothers put their own lives at risk bearing a child in their womb and giving birth. It requires a measure of bravery for parents to bring a child into this world filled with the bad news of climate disasters, gun violence, war, political upheaval, racism, food/water insecurity, and escalating health and higher education costs.

Luke 1: 26ff In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you... "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, ... the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God ... For nothing will be impossible with God." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

History has painted Mary to be quiet, meek and mild, submissive to God's will, but a closer read shows us that Mary was brave. Mary was neither meek nor superhuman.³ She had grit. She was faithful, courageous, strong and brave. Most of all, she was human. Her encounter with the angel Gabriel, the messenger of God made her brave. She knew that her pregnancy was dangerous and she could die giving birth. She also knew that as an unmarried teenaged mother it would cause upheaval in her family and community. She would give birth to Jesus during Roman occupation, a time of political unrest. Mary was *brave*. Her encounter with the living God made her brave

Her encounter with God gave her bravery and the faith to see that if God was calling her God would also protect her. It revealed to her that God chooses the people on the margins, those overlooked and underestimated. Bearing God in the world was to bring good news and hope to those oppressed. May Mary, the God Bearer, inspire us all to be brave!

This Advent and Christmas season, I invite you to be Theotokos, God Bearers. I invite you to carry the good news of Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection to all those we meet on this journey of life and the love of Jesus in your hearts always.

If your congregation is called to action, your love can reach innocent civilians and rush aid to families in crisis right now.



Prayer Ventures for December

- **1** World AIDS Day Remember in prayer all who have been and continue to be affected by HIV and AIDS, and pray for the work we do together through the ELCA's HIV and AIDS Ministry building awareness, serving people who live with HIV and AIDS, advocating for change, and supporting effective, affordable prevention, treatment and care globally.
- **2** The United Nations estimates that 90% of wartime casualties are suffered by civilians. Pray for an end to the violence, loss of life, suffering and injustice caused by war and conflict in the world, especially in Ukraine and the Middle East.
- **3** First Sunday of Advent Praise God, source of our hope, strength, healing and new life, and Jesus Christ, who lived among us to reveal God's grace.
- 4 Approximately 15% of the world's population lives with some form of disability, including about 42.5 million people in our country. Pray for the Spirit to sustain our commitment and guide our efforts to welcome, respect and fully include people with disabilities in every aspect of society and the church. Give thanks for the work and resources of ELCA Disability Ministry, the Evangelical Lutheran Deaf Association and the Lutheran Services in America—Disability Network.
- **5** Pray that we will not lose heart when we read stories of the church in decline or hear fewer people expressing faith in Christ. Ask the Spirit to strengthen our trust in God's unwavering presence and work in the world and to help us bring the gospel to those still yearning for hope, healing and good news. "Your people long to greet you, my hope, my heart's delight" (*ELW* 241).
- **6** Pray for ELCA missionaries serving alongside our global companions and churches around the world. Give thanks for communities of faith where our mission personnel worship and celebrate their faith with siblings in Christ.
- **7** Hanukkah Pray for our Jewish neighbors around the world who are beginning their eight-day celebration of Hanukkah the Festival of Lights.

- **8** Remember in prayer people for whom the Christmas season stirs depression, loneliness and grieving. Promise to welcome these struggling people into our communities of faith and to connect them with new friends and siblings in Christ who will offer care and support during the holidays and throughout the year.
- **9** Reflect prayerfully on the symbolism of the Advent wreath and candles, which help us anticipate and celebrate God's boundless love and the promise of eternal life fulfilled in the birth of Christ a light that breaks through the darkness of the world and changes everything.
- **10** Pray that we will be faithful and enthusiastic witnesses to the good news of Jesus Christ for all people in every circumstance of life.
- 11 Give thanks for our church's commitment to service, generosity, justice and ending hunger and poverty for the sake of our neighbors in need. Pray that the ELCA Good Gifts catalog and the ministries of the ELCA will help us understand the needs of our neighbors and how we can work together to make a lasting impact in the world.
- 12 Praise God for the diverse Advent and Christmas traditions of the Christian church around the world, traditions that enrich our faith and understanding of how Christ has impacted communities, cultures and nations.
- 13 Pause during the busyness of the holidays and pray for our neighbors in need, especially those experiencing suffering, poverty, war, recovery from disasters and displacement from their homes. Pray that they will find relief, hope and renewed strength in the certainty of God's attention and love, evidenced in the gift of Jesus Christ and reflected in our concern, response and advocacy.
- **14** Give thanks for the seasons of the liturgical year and the Scripture, colors, symbols, prayers, music and rituals of faith that help us live in the rhythm of life as children of God and siblings in Christ.

- Ask God to help us reflect on those who are not present whenever we gather and to remember that these children of God bring unique voices, gifts and life experiences to the worship, activities and gatherings of our congregations.
- Las Posadas Give thanks for the tradition of Las Posadas, which recalls Mary and Joseph's Nativity journey and is observed in parts of Latin America and in some Latino communities in the United States.
- Pray that we will have the humility, honesty and boldness of John the Baptist, who did not shy away from expressing his faith in Jesus Christ even when challenged and threatened.
- International Migrants Day Pray for those who, with great risk and uncertainty, have left their home countries and familiar surroundings to seek welcoming communities where they feel safe, respected and free to reestablish their lives and raise their families.
- Give thanks to God for the assurance of life eternal in the kingdom of heaven and for the Spirit equipping us to embody God's compassion in the world while we await the return of Christ.
- **20** What stirs joy in you today? Give thanks for the people and experiences that bring joy into your life, even if only briefly. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).
- **21** Winter solstice As the days of the Northern Hemisphere grow shorter, pray that we will be guided and reassured by the light of Christ, which illuminates God's love, mercy and truth in our lives and in every corner of the world.
- Praise God for this time of remembrance, anticipation and celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, a birth that changed the world and our lives in ways that exceed our imagination and comprehension.
- Give thanks for those who serve our communities during Christmas, including people in health care, elder care, law enforcement, the hospitality industry, emergency services and the military.

- Christmas Eve Shout "Glory to God in the highest!" The good news of the birth of the promised Messiah and Savior for all creation and humankind has been made known to us and is the foundation of our faith and life.
- Christmas Day Lift up shouts of thanksgiving and praise for all to hear! God lives among us in the birth of Jesus Christ and pours hope and joy into our lives to fill their voids and mend our brokenness.
- *Kwanzaa* Pray for our African-descent neighbors and siblings in Christ who celebrate Kwanzaa, a weeklong observance of African culture and traditions that emphasizes family, community and shared principles. Give thanks for the rich and enduring practices of our African-descent siblings and the global African community.
- 27 Give thanks that the gift of grace found in Jesus Christ is both deeply personal and for all humankind. "Of what benefit would it be to me if Christ had been born a thousand times, and it would daily be sung into my ears in a most lovely manner, if I were never to hear that he was born for me and was to be my very own?" (Martin Luther, 1522).
- Christmas may have come and gone, but we carry into every day the joy of Christmas and the birth of the Christ child, the manifestation of God's love for humanity. Give praise and thanks to God!
- Lift up prayers of relief and thanksgiving for God's mercy, which is fair and generous and is never swayed by our actions or words, no matter how good or well-intended.
- Share with God your hopes, concerns, uncertainties and aspirations for the year ahead. Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our faith in God's concern for us and in God's attention to our prayers spoken and silent.
- New Year's Eve Our baptism with water, the word of God and the blessings of our siblings in Christ marks us as children of God and followers of Jesus, loved, forgiven and made new every day of our lives. Alleluia!


